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Celebrating our Principal

Trinity was the final term in the seven-year tenure of Professor Jane Shaw. And, as befitting a Principalship that has transformed the College, over the next two pages we take the opportunity to celebrate her legacy by featuring a range of tributes from the HMC community.

This term also saw the completion of Professor Shaw's official portrait, commissioned by the College, which we reproduce here. The work of celebrated portrait artist Hero Johnson RP, it will hang in the Arlosh Hall.

Following her retirement as HMC Principal at the end of September, Professor Shaw will be taking up a residential fellowship at the Swedish Collegium for Advanced Study in Uppsala in Sweden, where she will be working on a new book, Seeking Infinity: Mystics in the Modern World, a project which will also be supported by a prestigious Leverhulme Emeritus Fellowship.

And readers of *My HMC*, as alumni of the College, will have a final chance to bid farewell to Professor Shaw on 20 September at the annual Alumni Dinner.

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Among her many other contributions, Jane has brought a stream of distinguished academic and creative visitors to Harris Manchester. The ceramicist Edmund de Waal, the historian Linda Colley, the literary scholar Valerie Smith, the poet Michael Symmons Roberts, the playwright and actor Anna Deavere Smith: these figures have enriched and inspired our community. We all know that the Norrington Table is impossibly flawed but take quiet pride in the fact that, during Jane's tenure, we have risen from bottom place to third overall.

What are you doing now?

After leaving Oxford, I ran a progressive investment fund called New Media Ventures for a decade. I am now a philanthropic advisor to foundations and family offices in the US. More recently, I've been working on a personal creative practice and recently produced The *Emergency Was Curiosity*, a somewhat genrebending illustrated "book report" and pandemic archive inspired by Jenny Odell's *How to Do Nothing* and focused on cultivating individual and collective creative attention.

Best memories of HMC

I studied for my MBA at Said Business School and was a Skoll Scholar in Social Entrepreneurship. All of the Skoll Scholars were in HMC, and I loved the chance to get to know a handful of fellow business school students so intimately. It was also an absolute gift to be part of the broader HMC community alongside scholars from different disciplines and different countries.

Student spotlight

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I am Siddhartha Sensharma, and I'm in my second year reading for a BA in Experimental Psychology. I'm originally from Singapore and spent many of my school years with my startup, a machine learning based device for personalised automatic fall and crash detection and bio-signal based theft-proof access control, as my main focus. This led to insightful experiences, such as exhibiting at CES, the largest technology conference in the world. The startup world is, at its core, centred around the question of "how can I help?", making it easy to connect with people who have highly varied life experiences or roles.



For example, 'green', 'red', and 'blue' aren't innate qualities of objects, but rather labels that we categorise the world by due to our ability to easily distinguish between them. This ignited a curiosity on my part to understand the human mind and brain, since this was the lens by which we processed the information fed to us, and effectively created our own reality. I decided then to apply to Oxford, since I wished to explore these ideas through the tutorial system. To achieve this goal, I self-studied on weekends, taking double of Oxford's entry requirements.

At 18, I was conscripted into the Singapore Army, where I served as a sergeant in the Combat Engineers, commanding a section. The pace of life in the military was bimodal, marked by alternate rushing and idleness. In this idleness, I came across the work of John Locke, and was particularly intrigued by the idea that all knowledge we possessed was at least driven by, if not wholly dependent on, subjective experiences.

Coming here has been fundamentally transformative, whether it's interrogating an idea during tutorials, serendipitous conversations across subjects over meals, or supporting startups through running the OXI Incubator. HMC, with its natural intimacy and friendliness, amplifies the best qualities of Oxford.
